Birds Seen In Tarrant County

Fort Worth Audubon members and ornithologists have recorded over 375 bird species in Tarrant County. We regularly see 52 summer species, 103 winter species, and 61 year-round species. Shown on this page are a few of the waterfowl and wading birds observed on county lakes, ponds, and the marshes along area streams and river.

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Birds Seen In Tarrant County

The birds shown here are just a few of the many Passeriformes (sparrow-like) species commonly seen in Tarrant County. Listen for their songs and warning chips. Watch for their quick movements around bushes and reeds, and overhead in the trees.



Passeriformes make up over half of the 10,000+ species of birds in the world. Most birds are easy to identify by their color patterns and their songs. We recommend to everyone interested in bird identification to begin with a bird field guide book.




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Birds Seen In Tarrant County
